School and Campus Crime

Victimizations occurring at school are an important subset of crime, given the amount of time that young people spend there. While schools (K-12) and post-secondary campuses are relatively safe places, victimization does occur, and the risks vary by context. Adolescents, for example, experience more violent victimizations at school but more serious violent victimizations outside of school (see Child, Youth, and Teen Victimization). And national studies suggest that stalking victimization rates are higher among college-age women than the general population. Concerns over reporting and preventing violence against women, in particular rape and sexual assault, have led to greater focus by campus administrators and policy makers. Regardless of age, students who are victimized at school often have their physical and emotional well-being negatively affected, as well as their ability to learn.


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School Crime

Type of Victimization at School:

Non-fatal crime against students age 12-18 that occurred on school property or the way to or from school in 2013



From 2003-2013 for students age 12-18, nonfatal victimization **at school** decreased from 87.4/1,000 students to **55.0**/1,000 students^F

– vs –

The rate of victimization **away from school** decreased from 69.1/1,000 students to **30.1**/1,000 students ^F

In the 2011-12 school year, there were **15 homicides** of students age 5-18^G












*The **FBI** collects reports from campus police as well as local and state law enforcement agencies through its **Uniform Crime Reports**. Data from 2014 includes information from approximately 650 campuses enrolling an estimated 8.2 million students.

The Clery Act requires campuses to keep records and **self-report crime**, particularly VAWA crimes, to the U.S. Department of Eduction. Data from 2014 includes reports from more than 11,000 campuses enrolling more than 78 million students.

The **Campus Climate survey**, tested at 9 schools in 2015, is notable for the validity of the survey tool.

**Data is combined as some jurisdictions have not updated their reporting systems to reflect new. separate FBI categories for schools and colleges.
